

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The Mayflower II Overnight, organized by our Education Committee and led by Louise Wagner and Mary Brown, was a huge success and we look forward to repeating the program next year.

Mary Brown and I started organizing the overnight program on the newly repaired and renovated Mayflower II in April and continued right up until the day of the event.

The overnight program was organized through the <u>Plimouth</u> <u>Pawtucket Museum</u> Education Department and allowed for maximum overnight attendance of 15 people. The vessel is under the control of the U. S. Coast Guard.

The enrollment filled quickly with Mayflower descendants, mainly from Connecticut. Our group met at the <u>Mayflower Society House</u> and walked together to Mayflower II. The group was enthusiastic, and Mary engaged everyone with fascinating Mayflower history until we arrived at the vessel.

We are honored to be the first group to stay overnight aboard Mayflower II since its restoration. The ship is newly fitted with electricity and two hidden restrooms. Not a cell phone rang during our time there, even though the vessel had wifi!

The catering department at Plimouth Pawtuxet prepared a period meal of salad, turkey, and squash, and the educational interpreters served us with crisp linens and an entertaining dose of colonial dinner etiquette. A wonderful experience!

Two significant features of the overnight program included the impressive lowering and raising of the mizzen sail and the signing of the Compact, a bonding experience for the group. We all came away with insight on how intense and dangerous it was to be a crew member aboard the Mayflower and the meaning of faith and civility in signing the Compact.

The interpreters were with us every minute, seldom breaking from their charming characters of Ms. Winslow and Samuel Fuller, continually dispensing history to everyone's delight.

Mayflower II Captain Whit Perry, his crew, and the educational staff took hour-watch shifts on board throughout the night. There was also security posted on the landing. We slept very comfortably on the 'tween' deck.

We ended our adventure with a continental breakfast and group photos. What a magnificent event! Hopefully, we will be able to do it again next year!

Dr Jeremy Dupertuis Bangs was a leading figure in the field of pilgrim history. He attended the University of Chicago before earning his Ph.D. from the University of Leiden. Dr. Bangs stumbled upon the topic of pilgrim history while working at the Leiden archives. People warned him that the subject was of little interest, and anyway, everything about it had already been discovered. His decades of scholarship proved them wrong.

Jeremy worked as Visiting Curator of Manuscripts at Pilgrim Hall Museum, Chief Curator at Plimoth Plantation (today Plimoth Patuxet), before moving back to the Netherlands where he founded the <u>Leiden American Pilgrim Museum</u> in Leiden, Netherlands in 1997.

Author of over twenty books, some of his major works include Pilgrim Edward Winslow: New England's First International Diplomat: A Documentary Biography (2004), Indian Deeds: Land Transactions in Plymouth Colony 1620-1691 (2008), Strangers and Pilgrims, Travellers and Sojourners (2009), New Light on the Old Colony: Plymouth, the Dutch Context of Toleration and Patterns of Pilgrim Commemoration (2019), Josias Wompatuck and the Titicut Reserve of the Mattakeeset - Massachusetts Tribe (2020), and a novel, De Kunst van de Scriptie (2023).

Jeremy's work improved the understanding of various aspects of history: art history, colonist history, American history, Dutch history, religious history, social history. For his contributions, he was awarded the title of <u>Knight of the Order of Orange-Nassau by King Willem-Alexander</u>.

His research also contributed to a better understanding of Native American history, especially land ownership in the 17th century. For his work, he was the proud recipient of an honorary wampum necklace by the <u>Cothutikut Mattakeeset</u> Tribe in Massachusetts.



About the Leiden American Pilgrim Museum: Located in a beautifully preserved house built circa 1365-1370 near the clock tower of the Hooglandse Kerk, the Leiden American Pilgrim Museum tells the stories of the founders of New England, the Pilgrims.

Furnishings from Pilgrim times show aspects of daily life, while events involving the Pilgrims themselves are illustrated with a remarkable collection of sixteenth and seventeenth-century maps and engravings by such artists as <u>Gerard Mercator</u>, <u>Adrian van de Venne</u>, <u>Adriaen van Ostade</u>, and <u>Jacques de Gheyn</u>.

Those who wish to visit the museum must reserve tickets for a partiular time slot because the museum can only accommodate a certain number of visitors at one time.

From the Bookshelf - Katherine Simmons

Generations of American children have learned about their Pilgrim forefathers with an emphasis on the fathers. Today, scholarship concerning our Pilgrim ancestors has diversified to include more information on the lives of women, children and indigenous populations. The following books are appropriate for ages 4 through 9.


<u>Sarah Morton's Day</u>, written by Kate Waters and illustrated with photographs by Russ Kendell, tells the story of a fictional Pilgrim girl named Sarah Morton. We learn about Sarah's background and then follow Sarah through her day on November 12, 1627. We learn about her clothes and watch Sarah tend to her chores, making pudding, setting the table for a meal, feeding the chickens, and milking the cows all the while talking to her friend about how much she misses her deceased father. We watch Sarah take writing lessons with her new father and we share her emotion when a ship arrives with new visitors to their settlement.


Kate Waters and Russ Kendall collaborated again with <u>Samuel Eaton's Day: A Day in the Life of a Pilgrim Boy</u>. Once again, we follow Samuel through his day on July 16, 1627. Samuel has been looking forward to this day, for it is the first time that he will be helping with the rye harvest. Samuel wakes early, gets dressed and does his chores, fetching water, checking his snares for any animals that may have been caught, and bringing in firewood. Then Samuel and his family eat before he heads out for the harvest with his father. Samuel gathers and binds the rye after it has been cut. After harvesting the rye, Samuel gathers some mussels for the evening meal, completely exhausted from the day's adventures.


Author Kate Waters and photographer Russ Kendall worked with Plimoth Plantation, now Plimoth Patuxet Museum on these books and another companion volume <u>Tapenum's Day: A Wampanoag Indian Boy in Pilgrim Times</u>. Tapenum's day shows what daily indigenous life was like at the time and place of the Plimoth settlement. Tapenum's goal is to become a pniese, described as "a special kind of warrior counselors." He's disappointed not to have been chosen for training this year, but decides to work harder and seek advice from Waban, an elder pniese.

Author Kate Waters earned her B.A. from Newtown College of the Sacred Heart (Boston College) and a Masters degree from Simmons Graduate School of Library and Information Science. Working as a librarian for ten years at the Boston Public Library, she became interested in telling stories to young people and finding out what they enjoyed reading. She then moved to New York where she worked on a children's magazine where she started to think about new ways to present history and traditions to children. Her books include pictures of actors depicting the stories Kate writes. Born in Texas in 1957 but growing up on Cape Cod, Russ Kendall graduated from Boston University with a journalism major and has worked as a newspaper photographer in Alaska and New Hampshire.

CONNECTICUT MAYFLOWER SOCIETY MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES April 22, 2023, The Woodwinds, 29 School Ground Road, Branford CT 06405

Call to Order, Invocation and Presentation of Colors: Governor Gregory Thompson called the meeting to order at 11:41 a.m. noting the large turnout of 113 people for today's meeting. Elder Sandra Bullock delivered the invocation. Captain William Lane presented the colors and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Introductions: Governor Thompson introduced the Connecticut Mayflower Society Board of Assistants and our program speaker Vincent Pitts.

Necrology and Memorial Prayer: Elder Sandra Bullock read the necrology and delivered a memorial prayer.

Reading of the Mayflower Compact and Roll Call of the Ancestors: David Grant read the Mayflower Compact and led the Roll Call of the Ancestors. William Brewster and his family had 26 descendants present. The tally of descendants (present at the meeting) of other Mayflower passengers and their families included John Howland (20), Stephen Hopkins (15), Francis Cooke (15), William Bradford (14), Richard Warren (14), John Alden (13), John Tilley (13), George Soule (11), William Mullins (10), James Chilton (8), Edward Doty (7), John Billington (6), Francis Eaton (5), Edward Fuller (5), Myles Standish (5), Isaac Allerton (4), Thomas Rogers (4), Henry Samson (4), Samuel Fuller (3), William White (2), Degory Priest (1).

Minutes of the General Membership Meeting on October 29, 2022: The minutes of the October Meeting were approved following a motion by William Lane and seconded by Midge Hurtuk.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer David Grant reported that we are in a good financial position and able to meet our obligations. The Wells Fargo Operating Account stands at \$48,484. He further reported that the William Murray Fund, Life Membership Fund and Scholarship Fund stand at \$3,098, \$241,777, and \$277,027, respectively.

Historian's Report: Historian Midge Hurtuk read the names of 30 new members and 7 members transferred in from other chapters. On a motion made by Kerry Comisky and seconded by Sandra Bullock, the members report was accepted. New members and transfers in, present at the meeting, were recognized by the membership.

Connecticut Governor's Appreciation Awards: Governor Gregory Thompson presented awards to David Grant for his long service handling the finances and budget of CT Mayflower Society; to Joan Prentice for her expert handling of the membership rolls and dues collection; and to Kathy Simmons for her informative newsletter and complete meeting minutes. Thompson further recognized a family representing four generations of John Howland descendants present at the meeting and noted milestone anniversaries of various Society members.

Meeting Recess: Governor Thompson recessed the meeting for lunch from 12:35 to 1:43 pm.

Raffle: Governor Thompson thanked donors and organizers of the raffle. The raffle raised a record \$1,270 in support of the Scholarship Fund.

Scholarship Awards: Outgoing Scholarship Chair Mary Brown and Incoming Scholarship Chair Michael Pollock made the presentation to our 2023 Scholarship Award winners, Lily Talon and William Slater. Ms. Brown proudly announced that as of this year, we will make scholarship awards of \$5,000 to each recipient.

Program, "Our Marquis", LaFayette and America, a mutual admiration society:" Governor Thompson introduced Vincent Pitts who gave an engaging presentation on the life of Marquis de LaFayette, a French aristocrat who served as an officer in the American Revolutionary War and formed a life-long affection for and relationship with America's founders and our new nation founded on the principles of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. He is also recognized for the leadership and democratic values he championed as his home country of France struggled to adopt a representative form of government. We are thankful to Mr. Pitts who made a beautiful presentation and generously donated his honorarium for today's program to the CT Mayflower Society Scholarship Fund.

Retirement of the Colors, Benediction and Adjournment: Captain William Lane retired the colors and Elder Sandra Bullock provided the benediction. The meeting was adjourned at 2:45 pm.

Saturday, October 14, 2023 Annual Membership Meeting, 11:15 am-2:00 pm

Dr. David J. Naumec will make a presentation on the Pequot War. The Pequot War was an armed conflict that took place in 1636-1637 between the Pequot tribe and an alliance of the colonists from the Massachusetts Bay, Plymouth, and Saybrook colonies and their allies from the Narragansett and Mohegan tribes.

<u>Dr. Naumec</u> is Assistant Professor of History at Central Connecticut State University where he teaches both undergraduate and graduate history courses. His main research interests include Early American Social History, New England History, Native and African-American history, Military history, and genealogical research. He is active in the Connecticut Historical Society and The Guns of Norwich Historical Society.
