GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Although the weather is warmer, they have not had a chance to grow and vegetables or other crops yet. They have to decide whether to stay after a horrible winter with so many dying, or to return to England and Leiden. What would your choice be?

My sincere thanks to Paul and Donna Mangiafico for a wonderfully creative exhibit on the Mayflower II; it went so well with our program. The folks at Plimoth Plantation are seeking large white oaks so that they may repair the ship, which is currently in tremendous need of some TLC. It seems that Mystic Seaport has bought up much of the available tree stock, as well as live oaks that were victims of Katrina. They are repairing the Morgan and have several other ships awaiting repair, so they were not a source. The needed trees must be at least four feet in diameter and about 20 feet to the first branching. Do you have any on your property? Even if they are smaller, they can be noted for use after further growth. Peter Arenstam at Plimoth would love to hear from you if you have any knowledge of white oaks that could be used for this important project.

In April, we are awarded three scholarships to three outstanding young students. Please read the article about them that can be found in this newsletter. This news ties in with my joy at the introduction of our 2020 logo. William Warner designed, copyrighted and donated his design to CSMD for the purpose of raising money for our scholarship fund. We hope to be able to award multi-year scholarships by 2020. Bill has kicked

off the logo excitement with bumper stickers, pens and mugs. Many items were sold at the April meeting and Bill offers you an opportunity to purchase more items in this newsletter.

I sent one of Bill's bumper stickers to the Chairman of the National 2020 committee, who is going to propose the

adoption of our logo by the General Society. This would certainly enhance our scholarship fund and help us to achieve our goal.

Connecticut's 2020 Committee held its first meeting in March and has already begun to develop several projects. The committee is still open to suggestions for activities and programs related to 2020. Please contact our chairman Greg Thompson at gthomp5749@aol.com with your ideas.

October's luncheon meeting will feature the theme of pumpkins. Ellen Swayne is working on an exhibit, and we are currently setting up our program. The luncheon will once again be held at The Gallery in Glastonbury, CT. The date will be published in the fall issue of *Gratings*.

WITH THE 400TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE VOYAGE OF THE *MAYFLOWER* OCCURRING IN THE YEAR 2020 WE HAVE A UNIQUE OPPORTUNITY TO EDUCATE A GENERATION ON THE TRIP OUR ANCESTORS TOOK IN 1620. As part of the 2020 celebration, the Board of Assistants approved the following logo to help educate the public about the trip.



The logo utilizes the 0's in 2020 to show parts of the globe; England, where the *Mayflower*'s voyage originated and New England, where the voyage concluded. The logo is geographically correct and shows the ship traveling east to west, from England to New England. Euro style 3" x 5" bumper stickers are now available. Meet Bill Warner

Bill Warner, a member of CTSMD, has made a name for himself in a very short period of time. Not only is he a member of the Board of Assistants, he currently heads up the Scholarship Committee, and has been instrumental in choosing our scholarship recipients for the past two years. In addition to those activities, Bill designed the 2020 logo we have adopted and are currently using as part of our planning for the 2020 celebration. Please take a moment and get to know Bill!

Q: You are relatively new to the Mayflower Society; please tell us how you got interested and involved in family history?

Bill: I was always a history buff; we brought our children to all the major historical sites in the northeast including Plimouth Plantation and the *Mayflower II*. I started doing research about fifteen years ago and only got through the first four generations when family and work moved it to a back burner. A few years ago my youngest son was starting college and met someone with our last name who was a member of the Mayflower Society and asked if we were related. I restarted the research for my son and found he was descended from thirteen Pilgrims, none of whom were the ones his friend had.

Q: Who were your *Mayflower* ancestors?

Bill: Stephen Hopkins, Francis Cooke, William Brewster, Peter Brown, Henry Sampson, Richard Warren, and John Billington.

Q: How did you find out about them?

Bill: I did a lot of research online, with multiple visits to the Nova Scotia Archives, the New England Historic Genealogical Society, the American Antiquarian Society, Find-a-Grave, and other historical societies. I also received much assistance from our Historian, Midge Hurtuk.

Q: Please tell us about the rest of your family and if they are involved in the Society.

Bill: During my research I also found seven Pilgrims in my wife's family tree -- Edward Fuller, Edward Doty, John Howland, Digory Priest, John Tilly, Richard Warren, and George Soule. Richard Warren is the only one we share. Both of our sons are active in the society.

Q: What is your favorite part of being involved in the Society?

Bill: I have met many fine individuals that share my interest in history and genealogy, and most of them are cousins.

Q: Recently you designed a 2020 logo, which the CT Society is using in preparation for the 400th anniversary of the *Mayflower* sailing. What made you decide to take the time to do this?

Bill: I would like to say that I am a talented individual who saw a challenge and accepted it, but the truth is I was lying in bed trying to go to sleep when I got an inspiration from God. He showed me the design and gave me the tools to put it to paper.

Q: What can you tell us about your design? Please describe the different parts of the design and tell us about their significance.

Bill: 2020 will be the 400th anniversary of the voyage of the *Mayflower*. It gives us a once in a lifetime chance to educate the public about our ancestors. I used the 0's in 2020 to indicate parts of the globe, specifically England where the *Mayflower* sailed from, and New England, where the voyage concluded. I used modern day maps so today's generation would recognize the shapes. For the oval and number I

used a deep red color so the logo would pop on a light background, especially against the Mayflower Society pink. I placed a ship representing the Mayflower in the midst of 2020 mainly because the logo becomes geographically correct with the ship sailing east to west, from England to New England. The placement of the ship in the midst of 2020 also give the impression of 20/20 which is appropriate because looking back in history is always considered 20/20 vision. How many of us would get on that ship today knowing what our ancestors endured 400 years ago?

Q: How would you like to see your design used by the CT Society?

Bill: I see the use of the logo as an educational tool, in one picture we convey when the *Mayflower* sailed, where she sailed from, where she sailed to, and the direction she sailed.

Q: Would you like to see it used by the General Society? If so, how?

Bill: I would like us to share the logo with the General Society and other State Societies; we honor our ancestors by educating others about their voyage and how it helped shape America.

Q: What made you decide to donate any proceeds from the logo to the CT scholarship fund?

Bill: I believe a good education is very important. I was raised a poor boy in the projects; the road out of the projects for me was an education. It took me nine years of going to college nights while working days to obtain my engineering degree. I became the Scholarship Chair to assist others and by donating any proceeds the Society might earn from the use of the logo to the scholarship fund, I hope we can expand the program.

Q: Are there any interesting or funny stories you can tell us about the logo or the design process?

Bill: Although God gave me the inspiration for the logo, he didn't help me with the

spelling. Sitting on my desk are two mugs with the logo. The first one was a prototype that includes two spelling errors. A few people reviewed the logo before I presented it to the 2020 Committee and no one saw an error until Donna Mangiafico, a member of the committee noticed I had spelled anniversary with an "e." I redid the artwork for the Board of Assistants meeting where the 2020 Committee presented the

logo. After a discussion the Board approved it. A couple hours later, as the meeting was coming to a close, one of the members, Sandy McGraw, blurts out, "Isn't there an "f" in 'Mayflower?" Seems no one noticed I didn't even spell the name of the ship correctly! Hopefully I have corrected all of the spelling errors, but there are no guarantees.

Amherst to pursue a degree in chemical engineering. I can only hope to walk in the footsteps of the first Pilgrims as I begin my college career.





Dear Diary,

The storm was horrible. The waves rocked up against the ship and sprayed the deck with a salty mist. The wind pushed the ship around like it was a toy and seemed to moan endlessly. During the storm I prayed and prayed along with the other passengers that God would protect us. In the end he did. Nobody was hurt, just a little sea sick. I think we are not too far away from America.

Dear Diary,

We have spotted America. It seems to be just a green streak on the horizon. We are running low on food and water so I can't wait for the fresh water and fresh food that we'll find waiting for us. I think there will be lush fields of wheat and grain, freshwater streams, and meadows to play in. I hope that we'll have enough time until winter to build homes to live in. I hope the fires will keep us warm enough and keep us from getting frostbite. I also hope the winters are not harsher than the winters in England. It is time for a new way of life and a new way of worshipping our mighty God.




