#### Lavius Arad Robinson, Jr., MD

An active and beloved member of many genealogical and historic societies, including this one, passed on in October of 2009. Dr. Lavius Robinson was an eleventh generation descendant from Reverend John Robinson, the Pilgrim Pastor.

Born in 1927, he was raised by his grandparents on the family farm in Putnam, CT. and received his high school diploma *in absentia* while serving in the Navy. He earned his B.A. Degree from UCONN and his medical degree from Tufts. He had a 43-year career as a solo practitioner of family medicine in Danielson, CT. and was known for his personalized treatment, including home visits. During a remarkable medical career, Dr. Robinson as an attending physician, Chief of Medicine, and Chief of Staff at Day Kimball Hospital and was instrumental in developing the first intensive care unit there.

Dr. Robinson was a board of education member in Killingly and was on the ballot for a third term at the time of his death.

The CT Society of *Mayflower* Descendants sends sincere condolences to Dr. Robinson's family.

(Governor's message Cont'd) at this meeting membership in the Society is now open to descendants of all passengers on the *Mayflower* –men, women and children passengers who landed and remained at Plymouth (but not the crew who returned to England). Historically membership had been limited to descendants of male heads of families. I would urge you to submit supplementals based on this significant change. I was also extremely proud to accept an award on behalf of our archivist, Gregory Thompson, which was presented by the General Society for his many hours of service in the technological preservation of the records of the Connecticut Society. Thank you, Greg, for all you do for our society.

I would also like to call your attention to an article in the December edition of The Mayflower Quarterly, written by Connecticut junior member, Faith Mangiafico. Faith describes her quest to achieve the Girl Scout Gold Award, which

is the highest achievement a Girl Scout can attain. Faith's project involves her *Mayflower* ancestry and is a great example of the younger generation's interest in history and the *Mayflower* in particular. We hope Faith will be an inspiration to juniors around the country and we wish her well as she completes her project. Finally, I hope that you are planning to attend our semi-annual luncheon meeting on Saturday, April 17, 2010, at the Gallery Restaurant in Glastonbury. Program chair Polly Gunther has arranged a great musical program that I know you won't want to miss. #### **NEW ELIGIBLE MAYFLOWER PASSENGER ANCESTORS!**

Some time ago, Plymouth opened up three new *Mayflower* lines for the eligible ancestors of females who made the passage in 1620 and who had children with husbands who did not make the voyage. They are:

Joan Hurst, wife of John Tilley Elizabeth Fisher, second wife of Stephen Hopkins Mary Norris, first wife of Isaac Allerton

Recently, Plymouth has approved a policy that departs radically from their established practice. They have opened lines from *all* wives of *Mayflower* Compact signers and of children who were on the *Mayflower* and left descendants. The women whose descendants are now eligible are:

Joan Hurst, Elizabeth Fisher, and Mary Norris reflect new lines – those of children of these women who were not fathered by *Mayflower* passengers.

None of the rest will create new lines, as each has already been available using the husbands or fathers. However, over the years, our current historian (Midge Hurtuk) has gotten many inquiries and requests about using these women and children either as first lines or as supplemental lines. Some descendants wish to recognize their maternal ancestors who sacrificed, suffered, and contributed as much as their paternal counterparts. Some simply have a favorite – and want the names listed on that passenger line on their *Mayflower* certificates.

While this is a very welcome eligibility change, it is not a financial change. If you want to do a supplemental (or know someone who wants to do a first line), the cost is still the same, \$150. If you're interested, get in touch with Midge at <a href="mailto:mhurtuk@aol.com">mhurtuk@aol.com</a>, and she'll get you started. In many cases, a supplemental using the above ancestors will mean just the preparation of an application. In other cases, such as if your original papers are very old, or if one of the above ancestors introduces a new line for you, there may be documentation to do. In all cases, Midge can check your original papers and be able to let you know what needs to be done. She will also keep you posted on any changes to this list through the *Nutmeg Gratings*. Plymouth is still working on the final list, and there may be even further additions.

Designated Connecticut's first "Official State Troubadour" in 1991 by the CT General Assembly and Governor Lowell P. Weicker, Jr., each year Tom presents assemblies, workshops, residencies and/or teacher-training for schools


spanning pre-K through college. He also works with senior citizens and does therapeutic recreation at nursing homes and rehabilitation facilities.

As a songwriter, he creates specially commissioned songs and jingles; and travels from Maine to Florida and beyond, spreading good will and camaraderie to, for, and with audiences of all ages.





Strangers and Pilgrims, Travelers and Sojourners: Leiden and the Foundations of Plymouth Plantation, by Jeremy Dupertuis Bangs



This book, published in 2009 and distributed by the General Society of *Mayflower* Descendants in Plymouth, is a Herculean effort by the founder and director of the Leiden American

Pilgrim Museum in Holland. The author of a dozen books, Bangs graduated from the University of Leiden with a Ph.D. in 1976, and was previously the curator of both the Leiden Pilgrim Documents Center, and Plimouth Plantation in Massachusetts.

Eight-hundred-ninety-three pages in length (including all footnotes, lists, appendices, indices, and bibliographies), this marvelously researched book contains dozens of seventeenth century illustrations, engravings, maps, photographs and drawings. The book begins in England with a brief history of the religious turmoil of the Tudor Age, and the beginning of the Protestant rebellion in Britain. Using the actual writings of the men of the time, Bangs outlines how and why this particular group of Puritans became Separatists, how clergy such as Richard Clyfton and John Robinson gave sermons in church by day, and how they were repeated among neighbors and friends by William Brewster in the evenings. Bangs explains the laws of the land, and how certain Separatists were ordered fined or jailed, while some outspoken men even lost their lives.

The majority of Bangs' tome takes place after the Scrooby Separatists landed in Amsterdam and then moved to Leiden. He outlines the arguments, debates and divisions among

the various groups of English refugees, and how they did not always get along. He also gives us a glimpse into scenes of everyday life, such as the local marketplace, weddings, fairs, and houses of the English refugees. We also see into the lives of the men, women and children who made their homes in Leiden in the early seventeenth century, including what jobs and chores they performed, and what church services were like. Bangs introduces us to the Walloons, a group of Frenchspeaking Protestant refugees also making their home in Holland. Interestingly, Plymouth's first governor, John Carver, had been a member of the Leiden Walloon church before joining John Robinson and the Scrooby group.

Bangs concludes his book with the resolution of the Scrooby Separatists to leave Holland for the New World and the reasons behind this momentous decision. The last chapters focuses on the journey to America, the *Mayflower* Compact, the early church, and the Plymouth Colony's relationship with the native peoples, and with later English groups such as the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

Anyone wishing a scrupulously detailed, wonderfully researched account of the lives of the *Mayflower* pilgrims should not hesitate to pick up a copy of this book. While the length of the book may be off-putting to some, it actually reads more like a novel than an historical text and is highly interesting. The cost of the book is \$55, plus \$12 shipping. It can be bought in Plymouth, or ordered by calling *Mayflower* Families at 508.746.5058.

## Here Shall I Die Ashore: STEPHEN HOPKINS: Bermuda Castaway, Jamestown Survivor, and Mayflower Pilgrim, by Caleb Johnson



Here Shall I Die Ashore
is the latest book by
Mayflower scholar and
historian Caleb
Johnson, the researcher
who discovered Stephen
Hopkins' true English
origins, the baptismal
records of his children,
and the burial record for

his first wife. The adventurous Hopkins not only participated in the founding of Plymouth Colony but, prior to that, had been shipwrecked in Bermuda, and had lived in early Jamestown Colony, Virginia. In fact, Hopkins was the only *Mayflower* passenger to have lived in both early American colonies. In addition to the biography, this 270-page book also includes many original primary sources, including the two surviving accounts of the Bermuda shipwreck, and an excerpt from a 1622 pamphlet describing Hopkins' trek to visit Wampanoag Sachem Massasoit. This work includes two scholarly peer-reviewed journal articles on Stephen Hopkins from "The American Genealogist," one written by Johnson, and the other written by Ernie Christensen. This book is available in both soft and hardcover at major book stores and online.


documents are now in an electronic format. The General Society of *Mayflower*Descendants, at its annual meeting in

### THE FURTHER ADVENTURES OF RICHARD WARREN XV


